For your prayers that have supported family and staff who helped with a four year old who had been molested.

For providing insulin for a young woman in her 20's who weighed 70 pounds, and has to learn to deal with her juvenile diabetes. It has been so poorly controlled that she has required a feeding tube and speech therapy treatment for her swallowing problems.

For helping cover the cost of a CT scan. The healthy construction worker developed "real bad" back pain, preventing him from doing much of anything. The scan showed lots of disc disease, and that the next to last back bone has slid quite far forward over the bottom bone. For helping with medicine costs for another diabetic - this one in his 40's, whose feet were ulcerated and bleeding when he limped in for his first visit. Now diagnosed with a bone infection which was so bad he needed partial foot amputation, he is facing a long treatment with antibiotics -- and scolding from me if he doesn't get his sugar controlled!


Will Seely, a student at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, did a family practice rotation at the Tutwiler Clinic this past August.



Fall 2009

The crops and harvest have been affected by a cool summer and now days of rain. Our need for generic and over-the-counter medicines is ever more urgent as farmers are delayed in getting onto the fields to harvest the crops.

Our medicine needs are:

ACE inhibitors

Calcium channel blockers, B-blockers, ARBs

Inhalers (Albuterol, Combivent, Advair, Spiriva)

Anti-lipids (Zocor, Lipitor)

Antibiotics (Keflex, Zithromax, Cipro, Levoquin)

Oral anti-diabetic (Glucophage, Diabeta, etc.)

NSAIDs

We can use the generic over-the-counter medicines such as:

Prilosec, Pepcid, etc.

Ibuprofen, Naproxyn, etc.

Claritin, Zyrtec

all type of sugar free cough and cold meds

Hydrocortisone creams

Antibiotic creams and ointments

Antifungal creams and ointments

TCEC Declared a PEACE ZONE

Always trying to find new ways of helping the children and teens to deal with their anger and solve problems in a non-violent manner, Sr. Maureen learned about a program called "WELCOME TO THE PEACE ZONE" by Jayne Milak-Dempsey. Our education coordinator, Mrs. Genether Spurlock, studied the program, did an in-service for the staff and began teaching the 7-12 year old children who came to the Summer Program.

The PEACE ZONE PROGRAM teaches the children to increase the levels of calm, peace and fulfillment in their lives while diminishing the level of negative emotions. The lessons include character development so that positive behavior would become contagious, emanating into the community and eventually have the potential to create positive energies that could alter repetitive patterns of violence. Our children practice the peace zone exercise each day before starting their activities. They "breathe in peace and breathe out anger, breathe in joy and breathe out sadness, breathe in calm and breathe out chaos..." We really believe it makes a difference and we continue to work on this since starting up again in September. Mrs. Spurlock had the children write poems about the Peace Program. Kwamain seemed to understand what it is all about!

Dear Friends,


I like to go swimming because I can swim with my friends. I like to play basketball because it is my favorite sport. I like to play volleyball because I can hit the ball over the net.



SPECIAL SPEAKERS COME TO TUTWILER


