

Thank you so much.


If you only desire to send actual supplies, here are a few we could use---

Doctor's Rounds

She came with back and rib pain from running into furniture when she got up one night. Then the back pain worsened after she lifted something heavy. But somehow the pain didn't fit the stories. And it was YOU who paid for her office visit when she needed to come back. Our chest x-ray looked like pneumonia. Admitted to the hospital, the CT showed how bad it was, but also revealed the hidden myeloma, the cancer that was devastating her bones. Now in treatment, she is slowly improving, thanks to YOU!

And YOU also helped cover more office visits -

- > a nurse working for a bankrupt hospice whose last several pay periods have gone by without checks
- > for several children whose 12 annual Medicaid visits have been used up and their doctors refuse to see them until the new fiscal year
- > a young lady whose previously "cured" lymphoma has returned..
- > a patient with a cold who had a huge thyroid and is now feeling better because she is on the right Rx
- > a young alcoholic with bad belly pain who had to be admitted for pancreatitis (and many words from me!)

and then ...

The nurse from the Metabolic Center cornered me one afternoon. "You know," she said, after giving me a list of sugars from last week, "She's getting yellow." OOPS! She was definitely jaundiced when she came to the Clinic the next day. YOU covered the cost of her tests, and sure enough, she had liver numbers in the 900s (normal being more like 40s-50s) but no hepatitis. It turned out to be a drug interaction and after much instruction (and cooperation!) her sugars are better, she is no longer yellow, but now in control of her health.



At 47 unwavering love of his beer was catching up to him. His "pregnant" size belly was becoming more uncomfortable. Alcoholic changes in his heart muscle rendered it about as strong as a wet paper towel, able to pump a meager 7% of his heart's blood around his body. Worried, we called him up on his cell phone when he missed an appointment. "I'm in the ER!" he replied. It wasn't long before he ended up in Intensive Care, his fluid levels trying to drown him while his heart was shutting down with a pressure of 58/42. Emergency dialysis has saved him so far but I worry about his future...

Medical Needs List

Summertime is hot and humid. With less cotton planted this year, many seasonal workers are unemployed. It is through donations and physician samples that we try to fill the gap while accessing available medication assistance programs of pharmaceutical companies.

Your physician/nurse practitioner may have samples he/she is not using. Here's our wish list:

ACE inhibitors, ARBs

Calcium channel blockers, Beta blockers

Inhalers (Albuterol, Combivent, Azmacort, Advair)

Anti-lipids (Zocor, Lipitor)

Antibiotics (Keflex, Amoxicillin, Cipro, Levaquin, Zithromax, Septra)

Oral anti-diabetics (Micronase, Diabeta, Metformin) NSAIDs (Naproxyn, Meloxicam, Indomethicin)

We can use the generic over-the-counter medicine such as:

Aspirin 81mg enteric coated

Ibuprofen, Naproxyn

Prilosec OTC, Pepcid, Zantac

Claritin

all types of sugar-free cough and cold meds (not liquid)
sugar free cough drops

Hydrocortisone creams

Antibiotic creams and ointments

Antifungal creams and ointments

Ace wraps all sizes
