Doctor's Rounds

It was her first visit, "My toe looks funny." Off came shoes and socks. Whoops! Deep purple big toe. Cold, next to its neighboring warmer digits. Couldn't get a pulse in her foot, not even with the hand doppler. Oh, yes, she had a heavy smoking history, she was on her feet all day at work; yes, she was double her normal weight; yes, she had diabetes; no, she had no insurance—So you, her fairy God-mothers and—fathers helped out. Not only did she have high grade narrowing of the main artery in that leg. she had a 15 cm mass in her pelvis! No wonder things weren't working right! THANK YOU for saving her toe, and providing her tests and meds we're working on getting some income for her while she can't work. We are so VERY grateful

to you!

He stood tall, straight, at 6'2" and 7 lbs lighter than when I had last seen him several months ago. A trucker, his interstate route carried him all over, and his BP was usually stable, so I hadn't worried too much. Then came the call from his eye doctor. "Central retinal artery occlusion," he said sorrowfully. How could he drive a semi with that diagnosis? His workup showed how "stable " had betrayed him – born without one of the 4 arteries to the brain. the other vessels had taken over – but now he had a bulging neck disc on the "good" side and only 30% of the blood was pumping from his heart. Three days later he came in to try to twist my arm some more into letting him drive, but the risk factors for him at age 63 are just too great and the answer of course, was a sad "No." (but we're still friends.)

looked it. Little by little the story came out. He had been shooting up cocaine but had stopped 3 months ago. He had a bad cough. His stomach hurt so bad he couldn't eat. Then his mother, on the advice of her pastor, brought him here from 45 miles across the county. It took us about 5 minutes to line up his emergency admission. His mother, a short, weathered lady, hugged me so hard I caught my breath! And the work up involved 4 specialists, visible lumps of bacteria on his heart valve, abscesses in his spleen (necessitating its removal), pneumonia, then a fistula formed to the pancreas, and he had a special IV so he could get fed through his vein...Now, a month later, he is discharged home, feeling well, getting stronger, and admitting this was a life-changing event. Now you know why we appreciate your prayers! THANK YOU!

He had been to 2 ERs and still felt bad. And he

There had been a squabble between this young fellow and his girlfriend that probably made all the difference. She stabbed him in the chest (gently, I guess, as it just needed a few stitches

in the ER) but the chest x-ray showed something much more ominous – small lumps all over the place. (Diagnosed as sarcoidosis for you medical folks.) Now, after several visits to the pulmonologist, he is feeling immensely better, his pneumonia is no longer causing a constant cough, and he knows how to take his Rx – which YOU have helped us pay for until he can get his disability. Another huge **THANK YOU!**

And then there was the 88 year old emaciated fellow with prostate cancer whom I hadn't seen in years and years since he had moved. He had been admitted for dehydration and we were delighted to see each other again. While I was listening to his lungs as he was seated on the edge of his bed, he began to bend over, and finally got far enough to concern me. I bent down and he was digging into his sock where he finally pulled out a \$10 bill which he presented to me with tears in his eyes. "This is to thank

Oral diabetic meds-glyburide, glipizide, metformin
NSAIDs (Ibuprofen, Aleve, Aspirin 81 mg, Naproxyn)

We can use generic over the counter medicines such as:

Prilosec, Pepcid

Claritin

Sugar free cough , cold and sinus medicines

Creams such as Hydrocortisone, antibiotic, antifungal

Supplies:

Band-aids 3 inch wide, ace wraps



"I love every step of the way to Tutwiler' says Dr. Glossie Jointer, DPM. Each quarter she travels from

Moss Point in the Southeast corner of MS to Tutwiler in the Northwest corner to volunteer. For 2-3 days she provides foot care for patients. Many are at risk for serious foot problems due to their diabetes, hypertension and circulatory diseases. The warm, moist climate of



MS fosters foot fungus infections. Ill-fitting shoes lead to calluses. Corns, sores and lesions of the sweat glands are among the common problems she encounters each visit. Patients with diabetes have decreased sensation and may be unaware of an early sore, or the significance of a callus that may be covering a beginning ulcer under it. "I know that amputations have been prevented by the removal of calluses and corns'. Dr. Jointer teaches practical ways of daily foot care to each patient. She shows and tells, laughs and encourages.

Dr. Jointer's visits supports the staffs in their efforts in teaching foot care. Patients who have been cared for over the past several years now ask' when is the lady foot doctor coming back? Sign me up! "I look forward to each visit to Tutwiler Clinic and working with the staff and patients. I love what I do!"

We are grateful to our 5 coaches for their dedication and commitment to these young people. The teens learn basketball and many other life skills.








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
