Small gift bags like these were given to our clinic patients and Bargain Barn customers.



"I am writing this letter because something has been on my heart and mind for a while. My family (5 kids) and I are incredibly blessed. My children have more than I could have imagined having at their age.

I want to help a family out for Christmas and I want to be anonymous... Thank you for all that you did for me when I was growing up. I still remember...I just want to do my part and give back."

In early December, a similar phone call came:

"I can't forget all the times you helped us out over many years when I had nothing. My 5 kids are grown and now I want to help out. I don't have much money but I've saved \$20 to give you to help some child have a happy Christmas. I have to do this."

Doctor's Rounds

She lived 45 miles away; she had no money for medicines. A diabetic, she had already lost most of her vision, and now had foot ulcers; and she was unable to sleep because her husband had very recently died after being thrown from a car. At 56, she had begun to have problems breathing. Yes, she knew she had asthma, and she was planning to come to the Clinic in the morning...but her cousin, hearing her rapid, deep wet wheezing, insisted on an immediate ride to the ER, where she was found to be in fulminant congestive heart failure, with her heart only able to pump 13% of its blood around her body.

Now home under the watchful eyes of her family, she is breathing easier and learning to care for herself before she "gets bad sick" again.

He and his little brother had colds. He was alert and followed directions, watching his fingertips light up with the ear light when we played with it. But his little brother was more like a noodle than a mischievous kid. And forget playing. Yep, a positive Flu A test led to the right medicines and in a few days he was back to his usual self. THANK YOU FOR HELPING US BUY THE TESTING SUPPLIES!

The ER doctor paged me Sunday morning as I was making hospital rounds. He handed me an EKG – "Oops!" I said, as I skimmed it and found definite evidence of an acute heart attack in this 46 year old. Just back from a liver specialist in Memphis, he was quickly assigned to ICU, as his now-distant alcohol intake had ruined his heart muscle, making him a very fragile patient. And yes, we count on your prayers!

Medical Needs, Spring 2013

With our mild winter we have seen daffodils and forsythia blooming in mid February. Soon first tractors and plows were readying the fields for spring planting. Home gardeners will have aches & pains from weekend projects.

Our medicine needs are:

ACE inhibitors (Norvasc) ARBs) Calcium Channel blockers B-blockers Inhalers(Albuterol,Spiriva, Advair,) Anti-lipids(Zocor, Lipitor) Antibiotics(Keflex, Amoxicillin, Zithromax, Cipro) Oral anti-diabetic(Glucophage, Diabeta etc)

We can use generic over the counter medicines such as :

West Tallahatchie Habitat for Humanity continues to build houses here in Tutwiler. We have just finished house #37 with Felicia Gibbs and her family almost ready to move in. House #38 and 39 are being worked on and good progress is being made. We are still fortunate to have several college groups coming to work. In the Fall we had Villanova University, medical students from the University of Chicago, Roger Williams University, University of Wisconsin, Plattville, students from St. John's Neuman Center, Terra Haute, IN and one Saturday students from our own West Tallahatchie High School. In March we will have Holy Names University, Oakland, CA, St. George's High School and St. Viator from Chicago area. With all this fine labor, we keep the houses going.

At the end of each group we ask them to evaluate their stay. Some remarks that keep being repeated: "Wow, it was awesome." "People so friendly here." "J.D (our construction supervisor) was such a good teacher, we learned so much." "The dorm was great, nice and homey!" We must be doing something right! May our Habitat project continue.

Weight Watchers Comes to Tutwiler

Many times during the week we read in the newspapers that Mississippi is the most obese state in the union and the MS Delta is the most obese part of the state. We, at TCEC offer exercise classes for women and men to help them try to address this problem. A year ago we found a ZUMBA teacher in Clarksdale who came once a week and over 30 women came on a regular basis to participate. Many were getting in shape and enjoying the weekly sessions, with extra walks and exercise on the other days.

Listening to people talk, Sr. Maureen, Center Director, was convinced that people needed more information on food, healthy eating habits, what to avoid, what to eat more of, portion size etc. After several months of trying to find a WEIGHT WATCHER instructor who would come to Tutwiler. Sister Eileen Breen, the Nurse Practioner at the Clinic said she would do it. Sister Eileen has been on WW for over a year and lost 50 pounds. This qualifies her, with some additional training, to lead the WW group. We started on January 28 and at this writing have been going for 4 weeks. Twenty-five people signed up and come regularly. Thanks to grants from the Community Foundation of Northwest Mississippi and Dominican Hospital in Jackson, MS TCEC is able to pay half of the WW fee (\$66.00) for the 12-week program. Eight of the Clinic staff, hoping to give good example to the Clinic patients, and one of the TCEC staff are participating. Other staff people are eager to hear what WW is all about, so the word is spreading. Several people have lost 5 or more pounds, others are still learning how to control their food intake, but all are determined to keep at it. When the first 12 weeks are over, we hope to keep going.

ZUMBA will also be starting up again in March. Diet and exercise, a recipe for weight loss!

JAMBOREE SEASON AT TCEC

December through March is BASKETBALL JAM-BOREE SEASON at TCEC. Four of our very dedicated coaches come once a week and practice the children ages 9 to 18 in basketball and fitness skills. Then on the other days in the After School Program they practice what they learned. These are children who did not make the school team, but want to learn basketball skills and play other teams. Saturdays at 8:00 a.m. finds these 30 to 40 girls and boys accompanied by the coaches getting on our two 15 passenger vans, plus a school bus and heading out to other towns to try out their skills they learned during the week. They go as far as Como, MS, 60 miles away, and as close as Webb, MS, 7 miles away. Two or three times TCEC hosts the Jamboree and our gym is filled with 200 children, teens and adults who come out to "root for the home team." The Jamboree season ends with an Athletic Banquet at the end of March. Here the coaches give awards to the different age groups for: Most Improved, Hustle Award, Coaches Award, and Sportsmanship Award. A great night with lots of proud children and parents.

Delta Health Collaborative

Since March 2012 the Tutwiler Clinic has been participating in the Mississippi Delta Health Collaborative through the Mississippi State Department of Health. The project aims to improve and reduce the risk factors for heart disease and stroke. Patients of the clinic who have diabetes, hypertension or high cholesterol met with staff members Shelly Hill or Dianna Rushing to be enrolled in the 3 year program. A community health worker or nutritionist will make home visits and telephone calls to provide education and self-help information. Shelly and Dianna monitor patient's progress by reviewing the BP and blood sugar each visit and the results of periodic lab tests. They meet with the patients when they come to the Clinic . " I think that having someone come to the home or call periodically helps remind and encourage a patient. They often think of other things to ask about when they are in their own home surrounding," said Shelly.

In addition to education provided to patients, Shelly and Dianna have attended workshops to improve their skills and knowledge on smoking cessation, diabetes care and weight reduction.
