A 48 year old with chronic kidney disease; Oxygen level dropped below 80%; put him on O2; heart rate high but regular; changed his Rx let him go after his O2 came up again; got him another appt. with his kidney doctor, arranged a ride...

A 47 year old in the office after gall bladder surgery to remove a ONE INCH stone! She felt better!

~~

A 30 year old out of hospital with a huge right leg from a blood clot (a previous stent had scarred down). Her thigh was 35 inches in diameter—her other thigh was 'only' 27 inches. You helped us get her a cane and some RX to keep her blood thin.

~~

Discussed results from an echo cardiogram (you helped us pay) to see how bad was the heart valve malfunction that made a very loud murmur; then did diet teaching for a weight of 366 lbs...

~~

We gave a 64 year old patient a prize for not smoking for 18 years!

~~

A 90 year old got a ride from us to see the radiation oncologist about treatment for his 3-1/2" wide lung tumor. We'll continue daily trips as needed.

~~

A 72 year old who had a swollen, tender 'risen' on his leg came for a cane; taught him how to wrap his leg after we drained it; watched as he slowly and carefully signed his X on the treatment paper.

A 61 year old between jobs, breast cancer history, on a bunch of meds, she had no money for her BP Rx. You helped by giving her a bottle to last for 100 days. Tears came to her eyes as she thanked you.

A 20 year old with a blood sugar of 745 missed his insulin dose...didn't seem to care...

~~

Had fun catching up with a 75 year old former neighbor who needed Rx refill—her repaired hip is well enough to be active, so she can finish up losing the 22 lbs. She gained in recuperation!

And throughout the day, MANY PRAYERS OF GREAT GRATITUDE FROM ALL OF US for all you do for our patients! May our loving Creator hold you close and give time to rest!

Your physician/nurse practitioner may have samples he/she is not using. Here's our wish list:

Inhalers (Albuterol, Combivent, Azmocort Advair) Anti-lipids (Zocor, Lipitor)

Teen Helpers

For more than 15 years, Teen Helpers are hired to assist with the afternoon summer program for 7 to 12 year olds. The helpers must fill out an application form and write a paragraph about why they want to work at TCEC. The applications are reviewed and prospective teen helpers are interviewed by staff. In addition to getting a paycheck, teen helpers learn how to apply for a job, how to interview of a job and they learn the responsibility of holding a job. Teen helpers assist the teachers and they serve as role models for the children attending the summer program. One Teen Helper wrote:

"I love this summer working here. I am sad that it is about to end. I really like being a role model to the kids. I hope they learn a lot of positive things from me. The money is going to help me pay for the things that are needed for school. I have learned a lot and increased my maturity a lot." Dimp age 16.

Summer Program

The summer program started off with over 50 children attending and quickly grew to about 60 per day! Each afternoon, 7 - 12 year olds gather and play games in the gym, and work on computer skills, work on an art project, cook or go on a field trip! The Teen Helpers assist the teachers with the activities. An extra pair of hands is always helpful! At the close of each day, all the children gather in the main room and have a snack prepared by the students in the cooking area that day. The snacks are delicious and can get really creative! The cupcakes in an ice cream cone were a bit hit! A reflection from one of our children sums it up pretty well: "I learned new things in the gym. I liked going on different trips. I learned how to cook different things. I thank people for sending us money so we can go places and for sending us t-shirts and other clothes." Te'Asia age 12

Teens

Two nights a week, area teens gather at the Tutwiler Community Education Center for motivational speakers, to discuss current events and topics of interest to them, for computer time, swimming, bowling roller skating, and basketball in the gym. Year round, 25-30 teens come for "their time" at the center. During the summer, field trips are planned, too. Friday night and Saturday afternoon are "Teens in the Gym" time for pick-up basketball games. All players agree to the rules of the gym in order to participate. To sum it up one teenager wrote:"...I am a happy member of the TCEC Teen Night Program. I am 16 years old and this is my first year being apart of Teen Night. The Center is an important building because when you are here you might say 'this is your dream home!' I have learned a lot during this program, like being respectful, no drugs and doing positive things. I hope this program continues for a long time.." Dendrell age 16
